
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DEAR FRIENDS AND SUPPORTERS,

From loss to hope:

A family's journey through grief and gratitude

S ometimes the greatest gifts come from life's most painful heartbreaks. For Ben and Miranda Hertel, the past two years have been a rollercoaster of emotions but when they look at their two sons and baby daughter, all they feel is gratitude.

The Hertels live in Stratford, Wisconsin, just minutes from Marshfield. The couple has always been thankful for easy access to Marshfield Medical Center as they grew their family, but when tragedy struck in 2023, proximity to Marshfield Children's Hospital became more important than ever. Ben and Miranda were expecting their third son, but sadly after a completely normal pregnancy, the 22week ultrasound revealed the baby had no heartbeat.

While many members of their care team helped them through that challenging time, the Child Life and Expressive Therapies program played an important role in their healing. At Marshfield Children's Hospital, certified Child Life Specialists are trained to help reduce the stress of the hospital experience for kids and families through medical play and coping techniques. This service is provided free of charge to patients and is 100% supported by donations through Children's Miracle Network (CMN) Hospitals.

"We were first introduced to Child Life after our son Declan's stillbirth," said Miranda. "Our older boys were four and two, and our four-year-old took it hard and had a lot of questions. Abby from Child Life came and talked with our whole family and gave the kids a book about how we were supposed to have a baby but we had an angel instead. He read that book every day for a few weeks. It helped him understand."

"Everybody tends to keep loss quiet," said Ben. "But when you go through it, you find out how unfortunately common it is. Without all the staff at Marshfield Medical Center and Marshfield Children's Hospital, I can honestly say I don't know how we would have gotten through it. They were there for us on our darkest days."



Together, the Hertel family focused on hope and healing. Later that year, Miranda became pregnant again, though she experienced some challenges. She had to be put on blood pressure medication early on in her pregnancy, and her 20-week ultrasound revealed placenta previa. She was also hospitalized twice to monitor bleeding. In mid-January things seemed to stabilize, but late the night of January 21 Ben called the ambulance when Miranda experienced a full abruption.

Thankfully their obstetrician, Dr. Caitlin Timmers was on call that night to help provide some relief when the team needed to perform an emergency c-section.

"For me, having Dr. Timmers there made me feel we were in the best hands possible," said Ben. "I wasn't allowed to go back for the surgery, but after Miranda was prepped Dr. Timmers came in and gave me a hug and just told me, 'I got them.' Maybe other doctors would do that, but that's what real health care should be."

Nine weeks before her due date, baby Ariya made an early entrance into the world at just 3 pounds, 14 ounces.





Ariya was immediately admitted into the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Marshfield Children's Hospital. There she had round-the-clock specialty care by a trained care team for 46 days until she was ready to go home.

The Marshfield Children's Hospital NICU has provided care for high-risk infants and their families for more than 50 years. The NICU is a Level III facility, the second-highest accreditation, which means staff can offer specialized care and surgeries on-site. More than 300 babies per year are cared for at the NICU, with more than 150 of those being transferred in from facilities throughout central and northern Wisconsin. The NICU transport team is on standby 24-7 to bring babies and children to and from Marshfield Children's Hospital.

Partnership with Children's Miracle Network (CMN) Hospitals allows the Marshfield Children's Hospital NICU to provide care beyond treatment for families. In addition to funding programs like Child Life and Expressive Therapies, donations to CMN Hospitals provide equipment like isolettes to help regulate infants' body temperatures and NicView cameras to provide a way for family members to keep an eye on their baby when they must leave the hospital. The Hertel family utilized these services during Ariya's NICU stay, and recognized how fortunate they are to live and work close to the facility.

"For the majority of our stay, we shared our NICU pod with families of infants who were transported from other areas," said Ben. "Just the fact that I could go up there on my lunchbreak-we are so fortunate to have Marshfield Children's Hospital so close to home."

During Ariya's time in the NICU, the Hertels developed close relationships with members of their care team.

"When you think of the NICU, you think of elite care for the babies, but that care extends to the whole family," said Ben. "Every nurse we encountered would check on us, even if they weren't on our case. They made us a priority. Over our whole journey with Declan and then with Ariya, we really developed strong relationships with a lot of the doctors and nurses. We've created lifelong friends."

"Abby from Child Life remembered our family and our story," said Miranda. "She would give the boys items so they could create crafts to put on Ariya's isolette which

really helped the boys feel involved. I cannot describe how incredible Child Life has been for the boys. They actually ask to go back to the hospital to visit with Abby."

Child Life also helped their oldest son who was struggling with the concept of Ariya's hospitalization.

"He had trouble with the idea that Ariya wasn't coming home, because Declan never came home," said Ben. "He kept having bad dreams that he didn't feel he could explain to us. He didn't want to burden us. Abby offered to have him come in and talk to her and it was like the flip of a switch. After one session with her, he was able to talk about his feelings with us and he's been much more open ever since."

Thankfully, Ariya experienced minimal issues during her NICU stay and early March 2024, she was ready to go home. While the transition was nerve-wracking, having continued support from Marshfield Children's Hospital staff made it easier for everyone. The family adjusted quickly and Ariva and her brothers are currently doing well.

NEONATAL INTENSIVE CARE UNIT AT MARSHFIELD CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

Marshfield Children's Hospital cares for high-risk infants at central Wisconsin's only Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (second-highest accreditation) located within a designated children's hospital. The board-certified NICU team has cared for thousands of infants from 24-42 weeks gestational-age in the current 24-bed facility for more than 50 years. The Marshfield Children's Hospital NICU offers surgeries and specialty services on site, and the Marshfield Medical Center Birth Center provides access to board-certified Maternal Fetal Medicine Specialists who work in tandem with our NICU. The NICU transport team is on standby 24 hours a day, seven days a week to offer safe transportation for infants throughout central and northern Wisconsin.

"Just the relief that we've felt through what have been some of the hardest times in our lives, having access to these services has made it so much easier," said Miranda. "As parents, you don't know how to explain death to a child. You don't know how to explain their new sibling is in the NICU. These services are invaluable for us here in rural Wisconsin."

The Hertels are passionate about ensuring that other families have access to care at Marshfield Children's Hospital. Ben's employer, Prevail Bank, is even hosting a special fundraiser for CMN Hospitals to raise support and awareness.

"It's not always easy to tell our story, but Declan deserves his story to be told, and Ariya is going to tell her own story," said Ben. "We are unbelievably fortunate to have these services here and we could never repay the support that's been given to our family."

They say that opposites attract, and meeting Walter and Karyl Hamelink, that old adage seems to be true. Walter is more reserved and quiet, while Karyl offers a big smile and is quick to engage in conversation with everyone she meets. But the couple have more in common than meets the eye. They share a passion for helping others.

Their shared dedication to giving back led the couple to become volunteers at Marshfield Medical Center in Marshfield. Together, Walter and Karyl have served more than 9,000 total volunteer hours.

Volunteers serve in 47 different areas of Marshfield Medical Center in Marshfield with more than 47,000 hours served in 2023 alone. Marshfield Medical Centers in Rice Lake, Weston, Park Falls, Neillsville, Ladysmith, Eau Claire, and Beaver Dam also host volunteer services programs. At each location, volunteers assist with various roles including helping patients and visitors, clerical work, and even offering support programs like pet therapy.

Currently, Walter serves in the mail room two days a week, while Karyl spends three mornings a week in the volunteer services office. The couple also shares shifts two afternoons per month in the Family Waiting Room, supporting family members of patients in outpatient surgery. They've also served in other areas throughout Marshfield Medical Center over the years.



Karyl began volunteering thirteen years ago after retiring from her role as a Health Unit Coordinator at Marshfield Medical Center. After injuries required her to go on long-term disability, she began to look for new ways to fill her days. She volunteered at another local nonprofit for a few years, and when that came to an end she found her way to Marshfield Medical Center.

"I just couldn't sit at home," she said. "I tend to be a person where if I'm at home, I don't want to go anywhere. This gives me a reason to get out of the house. Plus, I'm always looking for ways to be helpful. I'm always trying to bring a smile to people when they're stressed."

Karyl enjoys serving in the volunteer services office and the family waiting room because no two days are the same.

"I'm a jack of all trades," she said. "I like the variety and interacting with people."

With a dedicated volunteer like Karyl as his partner, Walter was destined to volunteer as well. Thanks to Karyl's cheerful persistence, he started as a volunteer the week after he retired and has continued to serve for the past five years. Unlike Karyl though, he prefers to serve in areas with more consistency and predictability. "My favorite place to volunteer is the mail room," said Walter. "I like the routine and knowing what's expected of me, but I still get to visit with people who stop by."

"That's why Walter and I are a great pair," said Karyl. "I'm the extrovert and he's the introvert. We have a good time."

Walter and Karyl have been happily married for 34 years, and they say this is part of what motivates them to give back.

"When you're happy in your life, you just want to spread it to others," said Karyl.

"We are blessed in our lives," added Walter. "It makes you want to do something for other people."

The couple is also dedicated to inspiring others to give. They've raised their five children to help others, and encourage friends and community members to become volunteers at Marshfield Medical Center.

Amaya's Story

Amaya's story started somewhere unexpected—in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Marshfield Children's Hospital.

At just shy of 27 weeks pregnant, Amaya's mom suddenly developed HELLP syndrome and severe preeclampsia. Physicians at Marshfield Children's Hospital performed an emergency delivery and Amaya was born weighing just 1 pound, 14 ounces.

Amaya spent 83 days in the NICU and was supported by specialized equipment until she was strong enough to go home. Over the years, she has struggled with asthma which resulted in pneumonia and hospital stays when she was younger. Today, thanks to her specialty care, her asthma is better managed so she can stay active and healthy.

Amaya has defied the odds and today is a healthy, kindhearted and bright eleven-year-old. She loves spending time with her family, learning at school and telling stories. Amaya shares her gentle nature and a smile with everyone she meets.

Bailee's Story

After an injury she experienced at the age of three, Bailee continued to complain of aches and pains. As time and her symptoms continued, her doctor ordered testing for childhood arthritis. Bailee's results came back showing something her family never imagined: low white blood cells.

A diagnosis of Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (ALL) was a whirlwind. Thankfully, the family had an instant support system in place with the Child Life and Expressive Therapies team. Bailee's family said, "they took the worst time in a person's life and made it enjoyable. She never was sad through all of it—she got better every time. They helped her stay positive and look forward to her next day, her next treatment."

Bailee's care included hospital stays, weekly treatments, and transfusions. Although her care was not received in her hometown, the two-hour drive to Marshfield still felt "close to home." As time went on, Bailee's appointments decreased to several times a month for another year and in July of 2020, she reached the end of her chemotherapy treatments.

Today Bailee is a brave, inquisitive, and outgoing girl. Her days are filled with quality time with her brother at home and playing basketball and softball with her friends. Bailee's future is full of possibilities and there's nothing that can stop her from what she wants to do—not even cancer!

Charlie and his family were filled with gratitude for his amazing oncology and pediatric nursing team, whose wealth of knowledge and experience answered every question and offered support throughout Charlie's incredible journey.

The Child Life and Expressive Therapy teams met Charlie's every need and more. They engaged him with music for special therapies and provided him clean, age- and abilityappropriate toys, from walkers to toy instruments. The team even created a custom Marshfield doctor's badge for his sister and threw the most special first birthday party a boy could ever have.

Charlie is officially in remission and eager to live his life to its fullest. Seeming on his way to becoming a Broadway star, Charlie turns on his charm for the spotlight, singing, dancing, smiling, and laughing.

Arianna's Story

Arianna's journey with Spina Bifida began during the very first ultrasound her mother received. The ventricles of her brain were filled with excessive fluid, showing something was wrong. At 38 weeks it was decided to deliver her early and place her in the hands of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) where she would receive surgery to guide her exposed spinal cord back into place and close the spinal column. Within 24 hours, she returned to the operating room due to swelling in the brain and was later diagnosed with Chiari II Malformation and hydrocephalus.

Shortly after she was born, Arianna's family was introduced to her care team of pediatric specialists. The departments of urology, neurology, physical medicine, orthopedics, GI, endocrinology, physical and occupational therapy, nutritionists and speech therapists would be included. They held a specialty clinic that allowed team members to collaborate and develop a custom care plan for Arianna, with follow-up sessions every 6 months.

Arianna struggled to meet fine and gross motor milestones but kept heading in the right direction thanks to her care team and therapies. As Arianna got older, she would face another challenge common in girls diagnosed with Spina Bifida: scoliosis. No amount of therapy or bracing was able to control Arianna's scoliosis and she eventually received spinal surgery to fuse 13 vertebrae. Arianna came out of that surgery and still managed to see the silver lining: she was now an inch taller, she no longer had to wear a body brace 24/7, she could discontinue the use of her ankle-foot orthosis (AFOs) and was able to wear normal clothes and shoes again!

Today, Arianna's positivity shines through in all she does she loves reading, volunteering at her local library, camping and of course, cheering on her favorite team, the Green Bay Packers! She is currently in "maintenance mode" but requires follow-up appointments with her specialists. Her family is grateful for the providers who took the time to get to know Arianna both as a patient and a person. They have become an integral part of her life.

Emmet's Story

Although their family had seven years of experience with Arianna's diagnosis, Emmet's would take them on a very different path. Emmet's medical journey began before his first ultrasound. Knowing his sister had spina bifida made him more likely to have it too, so his mother was assigned to a high-risk doctor right away.

Within 24 hours of delivery, Emmet underwent the same closure surgery as his sister without any complications. His next hurdle would be bowel and bladder function and required additional medical intervention before he left the NICU. Once Emmet was home, his family noticed lack of activity and alertness, which resulted in constant monitoring of his brain for swelling. After three months of observation, his brain would fail to keep up with the increased amounts of fluid gathering, and his care team decided a programmable shunt would be needed.

Orthopedic challenges would begin immediately for Emmet due to the severity of his Spina Bifida. Emmet cannot feel or control his legs below his knees and also has issues with dislocation of his hips, contributing to challenges with meeting gross motor milestones and requiring numerous corrective surgeries and castings. Emmet has braved four hip spica casts after said surgeries, which proved to be exceptionally challenging with his bowel regimen.

On top of various other complications related to his Spina Bifida, including speech development issues and continued bowel and bladder dysfunction, Emmet experienced seizures in 2021. After his third seizure, Emmet was diagnosed with epilepsy and has been on medication that has kept him seizure-free.

Emmet's extensive medical experiences have introduced him to many great providers, but by far he has grown to love "the fun gals" within the Child Life and Expressive Therapies department the best. These exceptional ladies have accompanied him to every one of his surgeries, helped him relax during difficult procedures and have joined him for numerous appointments. In his opinion, they have been the highlight of his medical journey. Emmet will continue to require specialty care and treatment plans for the rest of his life. His positive outlook and persistence allow him to continue and never give up.

Naomi's Story

Naomi was born urgently at 37 weeks after a lack of fetal movement, where she was found to have suffered a perinatal stroke. Naomi had an ischemic stroke where her brain was deprived of oxygen which resulted in her primary diagnoses of Cerebral Palsy and Epilepsy.

The cause of her stroke remains unknown, and Naomi has numerous medical conditions that require her to receive continuous and comprehensive care. Luckily for Naomi and her family, their hometown children's hospital, Marshfield Children's Hospital, is home to over 40 pediatric specialties. Specialists in nearly every department, including neurology, GI/nephrology, genetics, cardiology, endocrinology, and more, all work collaboratively to provide Naomi with the best care for her physical and developmental needs.

Naomi has received care at Marshfield Children's Hospital her entire life and her family is grateful for the skilled and dedicated care teams who are able to provide her exceptional care, close to home. Her mom Melanie says, "Seeing nearly every specialty and having multiple therapy visits since birth, having such access to these incredible services is truly life changing. These individuals are the ones that provide us support that over the last seven years has extended far beyond our scheduled visits."

Naomi wears pigtails, bright colors, stars, and smiley faces but what you notice most is her shining smile! While Naomi will continue to follow various specialists and therapists for years to come, she is determined to live to her highest potential. She loves helping others and as a regular customer at Cattails Coffee in Marshfield Clinic, has high aspirations of being a barista or "coffee maker" one day.

Jeffrey VanWormer, Ph.D., a research scientist and interim director of Marshfield Clinic Research Institute's Center for Clinical Epidemiology & Population Health, was honored as recipient of the 2023 Gwen D. Sebold Fellowship for Outstanding Research on October 11, 2023.

The Gwen D. Sebold Fellowship recognizes an outstanding medical researcher and supports their research in his or her chosen field. Since its beginning in 1988, a financial award and a memorial plaque have been presented by D. David "Dewey" Sebold in memory of his sister, Gwen. She joined Marshfield Clinic as a medical stenographer in 1955 and passed in July 1974.

Dr. VanWormer joined the Research Institute in January 2011 after completing his doctoral degree at the University of Minnesota. He has a strong and sustained track record of scientific productivity, including nearly 100 research publications over the past decade and has anchored over \$5 million in external research revenue during this time. His work has significantly contributed to the understanding of primary prevention of cardiometabolic disease, community risk factor surveillance, and agricultural injury and illness surveillance methods. Among his many other contributions to science, Dr. VanWormer's most impactful service has been leading the Summer Research Internship Program (SRIP) program, mentoring students from across the nation who came to the Research Institute to build their research skills.
